## Most LA pupils at segregated schools

LOS ANGELES—Most of the Los Angeles School District's 565,000 students still attend segregated schools despite a quarter-century of integration efforts and the problem is expected to worsen, officials said.

Central to the problem, the district's latest records show, is the steady decline of white students - currently at 20 percent and expected to hit 10 percent by decade's end.

Schools are now classified as segregated if their student body is more than 70 percent white, or 70 percent minority. Out of 644 campuses, 406 are classified as segregated - an increase of 17 in the past year.

Of the segregated schools, only 15 are more than 70 percent white. All of them are elementary schools, with the exception of El Camino Real High School in Woodland Hills. Jerry Halversen, asso-

ciate superintendent of schools, said the 15 white schools are geographically isolated and few minority students in voluntary busing programs are willing to take the long rides needed to reach them.

Jackie Goldberg, a school board member who believes integration efforts have been inadequate, said the district needs to take a broader view of integration involving all races.

## STATE HAS LOWEST FOOD STAMP ERROR RATE

CARSON CITY—Nevada has the lowest Food Stamp Program error rate in the nation and as a result, the state will receive an additional \$383,252 in federal funding, Governor Richard Bryan announced Tuesday.

This designation and funding comes from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

This is the second year that Nevada has qualified for the supplemental funds.

'Early next month the national director of the Food Stamp Program will visit Nevada to study the state's successful approach to controlling error/fraud in food stamps,' Governor Bryan said. 'His goal is to use the Nevada model in developing mandatory regulations for other states to follow.'

'This is a noteworthy accomplishment for the state and speaks well for the administrators and staff.'
