Mayor Bradley wins L.A. race

Mayor Tom Bradley won an unprecented fourth 4-year term Tuesday, as chief executive of Los Angeles, the nation's second largest city.

'I'll be very pleased to be part of history', Bradley told reporters after voting with his wife, Ethel. 'I've enjoyed serving for the last 12 years. I look forward to my next administration.' Bradley, one of the USA's most popular black officials, defeated eight other candidates in the non-partisan mayoral race. Bradley, 67, a Democrat, needed at least 50 per-

cent of the vote to avoid a runoff election in June. He captured approximately 70% of the votes
