

## Bill Sent To Merge Lt. Gov./Sec. State Posts

CARSON CITY — A bill was introduced into the senate this week that would combine the offices of Lieutenant Governor and Secretary of State.

The bill, SJR 35, was introduced by state senator Jim Bilbray (D-Las Vegas). He was joined in sponsorship by senators Jim Gibson (D-Henderson), Bill Raggio (R-Reno), Lawrence Jacobsen (R-Minden), Nick Horn (D-Las Vegas), Joe Neal (D-Las Vegas).

Bilbray in introducing the bill indicated that it would amount to a savings of some \$100,000 to state government.

Lt. Gov. Bob Cashell outlined that those savings would include the salary for a Lieutenant Governor, staff salary and operating expenses as no additional staff nor salary would be needed if the office of lieutenant governor and secretary of state were

combined.

Cashell has long been an advocate of increasing the duties of the office of lieutenant governor.

Cashell went a long way down that road in the 1983 legislature when he was able to secure the chairmanship of the commissions on Economic Development and Tourism.

Cashell has often indicated that if the lieutenant governor is to continue to exist in this state, the individual should be utilized to his maximum potential.

The combination of the two offices would take approval of two sessions of the legislature and a vote of the people.

## Assembly Affairs Committee Kills Cooling-Off Bill

CARSON CITY — The Assembly Government Affairs Committee Monday killed a bill that would have mandated a one-year cooling-off period for state regulators moving to the industries they regulate.

SB5, supported by Gov. Richard Bryan, the state Public Service Commission and state gaming regulators, went down on an 8-5 vote.

It earlier had passed through the entire Senate and the Assembly Judiciary Committee with no opposition from the regulated industries. No one opposed the

bill in Monday's hearing.

## Tutu urges world pressure to avert racial war now

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — South African Bishop Desmond Tutu urged Monday that worldwide "economic pressure" be exerted on his country's white-ruled government to avoid racial war that could affect the world.

"Please, please, for goodness sake, help us exert pressure, political pressure to be sure, but above all economic pressure," the 1984 Nobel Peace Prize winner said in an address to a joint session of the California Legislature.

"Help us, for we don't want to spill blood in our land. Help us avoid Armageddon, for if racial war breaks out in South Africa, you won't be able to sit on the sidelines."

He said a racial war in his country could hurt race relations in the United States and every other Western country with a sizeable minority population.

Tutu, 53, the Anglican bishop of Johannesburg, is making a six-day swing through California sponsored by several political and religious groups that are

backing anti-apartheid protests.

His appearance before the Legislature came as lawmakers are considering several proposals to curb state investments in companies that do business in South Africa. One bill would prohibit future investments in such firms by the state's two giant pension funds. Other efforts would hold up state budget funds for University of California building projects or pensions until the UC Regents vote to sell off South African investments.

Tutu, thanking legislators, said he would not be permitted to make a similar address in South Africa.

"I would not be allowed a similar distinction, because in my country, blacks are not really citizens," he said.

The government's apartheid policy of separating the races is "the most vicious system since Nazism," he said. "The final solution of the South African government" is "turning people into aliens in the land of their birth, for if you are an alien, you cannot claim too many,
