The Clark County School Board Trustees held their regularly scheduled meeting Thursday, May 9 at the Clark County School District Board 2832 E. Flamingo Room, The following items Road. were discussed and unanimously approved: The Clark County School District discussed was given authorization to develop, submit and im-plement programs to be fun-ded under the Governor's 8 per cent Education, Training, and Coordination Fund under the Job Training Partnership Act. The grant is designed to provide support for programs designed to offer educational services to individuals.

There were three programs targeted for funding: (1) Eligible inmates at the Southern Desert Correctional Center at Indial Springs, Nevada and at the Southern

Nevada Correctional Center at Jean, Nevada will be enrolled in (a) An adult high school diploma program through which they may fulfill the requirement for graduation and/or (b) Occupational/technical training activities in high demand employment areas as identified by he Nevada Employment Security Department, i.e., business and office, food service, building maintenance, landscaping, and health care occupations. (2) The second area is an extended-day, cooperative occupational education program will be provided for Job Training Partnership Act eligible students in grades 11-12 who are potential school dropouts, with in-structional activities in jobspecial emphasis categories. skills and with on-the-job training through placement in employer paid positions in sector locations. (3) The third area, a transportation program for handicapped youths, will facilitate the provision of

central kitchen, transportation and reprographics.

The Board of Trustees authorized the District to submit a grant application for Block grant projects under the Education Consolidation and Improvement Act of 1981, Chapter 2. This grant provides funding to local school systems for educational services in spacial emphasis categories.

These project activities will be conducted during the 1985-86 school year and will cover the following areas: (1) Library and Media Resources Program--Library books and other printed material will be purchased for district secondary schools and for private schools. (2) Nevada Assessment Center Program--This program is dependent on acceptance to the National Association, but will entail training 25 incertified dividuals as assessors who will form the nucleus of the center to provide training to threshold administrators. Thinking Skills Program--

This program will cover thinking skills common to reading comprehension, composition, and problem solving skills and will be incorporated into curricular areas and staff members will receive training. (4) Microcomputer Center Porgram--This program will involve staff training, maintenance of a software library distribution to schools on a lending basis, evaluation of computer software and hardware, and continued research regarding the feasibility of various approaches for the use of microcomputers
