Report says black children losing ground in society

WASHINGTON - Black respectively. children are losing ground in American society, according to a new study by the Children's Defense Fund, with some statistics reaching levels "that essentially guarantee the poverty of black children for the foreseeable future."

The fund, a liberal lobbying group for child welfare, said Reagan administration budget cuts since 1980 have reduced federal spending in "survival programs" for poor families and children by \$10 billion a year, and the cuts are showing in grim statistics.

The group said black children are more likely today to be born in poverty than five years ago.

In 1979, the group said, 63.1 percent of black children in female-headed families were in poverty, as were 18.7 percent of black children in two-parent or male-headed families. By 1983, those figures wre 68.5 percent and 23.6 percent,

The mothers of black children are less likely today to have proper medical care during pregnancy, and are more likely to be unmarried or under age 20.

One of the parents is more likely to be unemployed and the child himself is more likely today to be unemployed as a teen-ager.

If he graduates from high school, he is less likely today to go on to college.

The college statistic is dramatic, because whites and blacks were virtually equal not long ago. In 1977, 50 percent of black high school graduates and 51 percent of white high school graduates enrolled in college; by 1982, the white figure was up slightly, to 52 percent; the black figure had dropped sharply to 36 percent.

Marian Wright Edelman, CDF president, released the results of the study Monday at a news conference, and said the facts - taken from government statistical reports - "draw a portrait of the continuing inequality.
