Fire Restrictions Announced For Spring Mountain Range

The use of open fires will be restricted in the Spring Mountain and Mt. Charleston areas effective as of last Thursday. The Bureau of Land Management, U.S. Forest Service, and Nevada Division of Forestry have jointly announced concurrent fire restrictions for the Spring Mountain Range northwest of Las Vegas, including the Red Rock and Mt. Charleston areas.

This is the first year that restrictions are being imposed on BLM-administered lands. Restrictions have been imposed annually in prior years by the U.S.

Forest Service and Nevada Division of Forestry. Ed Spang, BLM State Director for Nevada explained that the BLM was joining the fire

restrictions this year due to the potential for wildfire disaster caused by increasing public use in the Spring Mountains surrounding Mt. Charleston.

The orders prohibit all open fires except in designated campgrounds and picnic areas, or within a building or recreational vehicle, or where otherwise authorized by a fire permit.

Open fires include all wood fires, stoves, charcoal devices, lanterns and other flame or heat producing devices used for warmth, lighting, ceremonial, cooking aesthetic purposes. Smoking is also restricted to buildings, vehicles, developed recreational sites, or clearings.
