Black activists cleared of fraud

SELMA, Ala. — A jury found three black voting rights activists innocent Friday on all counts in a Justice Department election fraud case that civil rights activists said was brought to stifle black electoral power.

The U.S. District Court jury of seven blacks and five whites returned the verdict after deliberating about four hours on the 15th day of the trial.

Applause broke out in the

courtroom as the jury returned its innocent verdicts for Albert Turner, his wife, Evelyn, and Spencer Hogue Jr. all active in rights work in Perry County.

The three were accused of altering the absentee ballots of black voters in what the Justice Department called a conspiracy to boost the vote for local candidates supported by the defendants.

Turner said after the verdict that the Justice Department brought the case because the growing black vote in Alabama was a threat to "the power politicians." Hogue said it was because "I stand in the way of the white power structure."

Justice Department attorneys have said the allegedly altered votes were in elections involving black candidates only and that there was no racial factor in the government's investigation.

Turner, a disciple of the late Rev. Martin Luther King, who helped lead the 1965 Selma-to-Montgomery voting rights march, hugged his lawyers after the verdict was read.

Ali throws support against initiative campaign in Africa

Former heavyweight boxing champion Muhammad Ali Tuesday threw his support behind a statewide initiative campaign against the apartheid regime of South Africa.

"Wherever I find injustice, I do my best to help," Ali said at a news conference called by the American Roundtable, a statewide coalition of religious leaders and anti-apartheid activists.

The initiative would require the governor to urge the Legislature, along with the President and Congress, to enact laws "implementing the public policy against any form of government using apartheid as a means of political, social and economic exclusion."

Jules Bagneris III, executive director of the American Roundtable, said his group has until Nov. 14 to collect the 500,000 signatures needed to place the measure on the June 1986 ballot.

He said the group has set its own target date of Sept. 12, the anniversary of the death while in police custody of black South African leader Steve Biko.
