James Chaney sentenced for embezzling federal funds

James Chaney, the former director of the Las Vegas Opportunities Industrialization Center, was sentenced to three years in prison Friday for embezzling federal grant money received by the anti-poverty agency.

U.S. District Judge Lloyd also ordered George Ernestine Boyle, a secretary whose handling of OIC

checks implicated her in the crime to three years' probation. She also must pay a \$1,000 fine and serve 500 hours of community service.

James "Night Train" Nelson, one of several people who received federal money for consulting services never provided, was sentenced to six months' probation. He also must make restitution of \$1,100 and serve 250 hours of community service.

Each of the three had pleaded guilty to charges associated with the embezzlement of \$28,000 in grant money from the federal Economic Development Administration. Federal prosecutors say money was paid to bogus employees and consultants, with most of it returned to Chaney as kickbacks.

Robert Hill, the former EDA regional administrator, was convicted in June of accepting a \$1,000 gift from Chaney but was acquitted of bribery and conspiracy charges. He is appealing.

Chaney had faced up to 15 years in prison for extortion and up to five years for suborning perjury. However, federal prosecutor James Erbeck recommended that Chaney receive a maximum of three years imprisonment in exchange for pleading guilty and for testifying against Hill.

NEDCO gets funds to help minority firms

The Nevada Economic Development Co. of Las Vegas has received its 12th annual contract with the Commerce Department's Business Minority Development Agency for assisting the formation and expansion of minority-owned firms.

This year's contract award totals \$185,442.

William Bailey, president Nevada Economic said the Development, company assisted about 60 firms last year. Services include help in marketing, finance, construction management, bonding, inventory control and personnel management.

The company provides its services to businesses for a fee of \$10 per hour for firms projected to gross under \$500,000 a year.

Four injured in youth gang NLV shootings

NORTH LAS VEGAS - Four people were injured by shotgun fire late Monday night in what North Las Vegas Police said Tuesday was the result of retailiation by one youth gang against

One man suffered a wound to his cheek in one incident, while a man and two juvenile males suffered pellet wounds in a similar incident nearly an hour later. NLV Detective Lt. Dorin Goudreau said.

At 9:45 p.m., a couple sitting in a car on Gowan Avenue was suprised when some teenagers pulled alongside them in a car and blasted pellets from a sawedoff shotgun into their car, striking the 19-year-old man in the cheek, Goudreau said.

About 45 minutes later, an adult and three teenagers were walking near Alma Drive and Lockwood Avenue when two teenagers armed with sawed-off shotguns opened fire on them.

One youth was struck in the left arm and right leg from the three rounds fired, while a 24-year-old man and another juvenile suffered minor pellet injuries and were treated at the scene, Goodreau said.

The most seriously woulded youngster, believed to be the target of the attack, was taken to Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital where he underwent surgery and was in stable condition Tuesday.


