In the Southern Nevada area, an MDA clinic is located at Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital. MDA also sponsors some 70 summer camps throughout the country for youngsters with neuromuscular diseases.

Ed McMahon will once again serve as anchorman, and Casey Kasem, Sammy Davis, Jr., and Tony Orlando will encore as Jerry Lewis' co-hosts, Davis from Atlantic City and Orlando from New York City.

In most of the hours during which the show is on the air, each station carrying it will cut in for 15 minutes with local programming. Lewis noted that local affiliates use this time to inform viewers about what MDA does with the money it receives.

MDA supports some 240 hospital-affiliate clinics nationwide, where patients with any of the 40 neuromuscular diseases covered by the association's programs can receive medical care, counseling and selected orthopedic aids.
