The Pointer Sisters have built their popularity on a career that began more than a decade ago. In 1971 they met their first manager Dave Rubinson and soon began backup singing for artists like Boz Skaggs and Taj Mahal. Their first album, The Pointer Sisters, showcased

"Cloudburst," a jazz scat song, and the countrywestern cut "Shaky Flat Blues." Both their first and second album, "That's A Plenty' were certified gold. 'Fairy Tale,' from That's A Plenty rose high on the country-western charts and was later recorded by Elvis Presley.

The Pointer Sisters made their first television appearance on "The Helen Reddy Summer Special,' and have performed on "The Carol Burnett Show," "The Merv Griffin Show" and on specials with Mac Davis, George Burns and Patty Andrews of The Andrews Sisters.

Musical direction from Richard Perry helped produce the popular sounds of their 1978 album, Energy, with its million-seller "Fire." Priority and Special Things were their rock and roll albums. From the latter came the hit single "He's So Shy," with the dance rhythm and pop sound that has become associated with the group.
