Nu Announces Computer Science Degree Program

The Fox-Morris Agency named the computer industry as one of the "hottest fields for the 1980's." Their job market survey forecasts average yearly salaries of \$33,000 to \$43,500 for programmers and \$38,000 to \$52,500 for systems analysts.

Successful completion of a computer aptitude test, administered free of charge by National University, is necessary for admittance to computer science degree programs.

School Lunch & Breakfast **Policy Outlined**

The Clark County School District today announced its policy for determining eligibility of children who may receive free and reduced price meals served under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast programs.

The following family size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility. Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms are available in all schools along with a letter to parents or quardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, an adult member of the household should fill out the application for free or reduced price meals as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the cafeteria manager in the school. All be questions must answered. An application cannot be processed by the school unless it contains the total household income listed by the amount received by each household member and the source of income (wages, child support, etc.), OR a food stamp case number if the family receives food stamps: names of all household members; social security numbers of all household members 21 years of age or over or the word "NONE" if the household member does not have a social security number; and the signature of an adult household member. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

The information provided by the family is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data. In the operation of school nutrition programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, national origin, sex, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes there has been discrimination, a letter should be sent to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

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
