

Beverly concluded by stating that her success in school had been because of the encouragement she had received from her parents, her school counselors, and her teachers.

LaMarsha Frazier is enrolled in the JINGS program. JINGS stands for Job Incentives for Nevada Graduates. This is a unique program for LaMarsha and the other students as it is designed to aid them in understanding the world of work, themselves, and developing personal and eductional goals for life. LaMarsha's career choice is in nursing or in X-ray

technology, and through this class, she has made preparation for work and for a post secondary education.

Police are investigating the death of a 22-year-old man who was shot four times early today after entering a North Las Vegas apartment, authorities said.

The man, whose name was withheld pending notification of relatives, suffered four gunshot wounds from a .30-caliber rifle in the 12:49 a.m. shooting at 2208 McCarran St., according to a police

Lt. Dorin Goudreau said a man apparently knocked loudly on a door before entering the apartment.

Gunfire reportedly erupted when he got inside the building.

The man, who sustained two wounds to the face and two to the chest, was pronounced dead at the scene.
