WESTERN HIGH SCHOOL The "We" in Western High School

Take the first two letters of Western and you find the word, "we." Over the years, that "we" has come to symbolize the unity, pride, and cohesiveness that has been the trademark of this school's student body, faculty, and alumni. Today, that "we" can be found as you talk with the staff members or the principal, Dr. Brian Cram. His opening quote to me during our interview was, "We believe educational excellence and the world of work are inseparable, and we believe that education is preparation for life and preparation for opportunities for employment and opportunities for a creative and meaningful adulthood.

Dr. Brian Cram, with his unique style which exudes friendliness to the students and staff, practices that "we," as does Mr. C.J. Hall, Jr., a counselor at the school. It would be difficult for me to write an article about Western High and not include C.J. because, like so many employees of the District, C.J. is a product of the Clark County School District and a student I had an opportunity to work with "just a few years ago." As I talked to these two men about the vocational program at Western High School and

about the philosophy of education, it was impressive to note the similarity in statement, but it was more than just words, it was the similarity in feeling and believing.

A Family Tradition Exists at Western High School

Over the years, Western High School has served thousands of young men and women who have entered the school and graduated achieving a high degree of scholarship. The vocational program offered at Western High School this year features courses in Business and Office Occupations, Home Economics Education, Trade and Industrial Education, and a Cooperative Vocational Education program. Any number of classes will exist in these broad program areas to accommodate the interest and occupational needs of the students enrolled at this school.
