#### Full Deliverance Gospel Church gets deadline to find new location

The congregation of the Full Deliverance Gospel Church in North Las Vegas will have to find a new place to worship by mid-January, the City Council decided Wednesday.

And, before they can hold any more services in their storefront church at 810 E. Lake Mead Blvd., they will have to repair potentially life-threatening building code violations.

The council ordered the congregation to immediately repair a gas leak in the church's kitchen stove and to upgrade the locks on some of the doors before any more meetings are held in the building because those problems could pose a threat to human life.

Roger Condie, the assistant building department director who inspected the building Wednesday, said the most

hazardous violation concerns the design and location of the building's exits.

The exits are situated and constructed in such a way that it could be difficult to evacuate the building quickly in case of fire, Condie said, adding that that is a structural problem that cannot be easily corrected.

The life-threatening violations were among the 11 building and fire code violations found by city inspectors.

Council members said they thought the church should move both because the inspection showed the building is not suitable for a church and because allowing the church to move into the commercially zoned area last year was only supposed to be a temporary measure.

The church has been operating at the Lake Mead store since November on a

temporary 12-month use permit issued by the city. Church representatives told the council last year that they planned to use the store as their church site only until they could arrange for a permanent location.

Doretha Ruffin, church financial secretary, said the 75-member congregation has been looking for a new location and should be able to make the move by the Jan. 15 deadline

To address this problem, the Graduate Management Admission Council (GMAC), a non-profit organization of 76 of the nation's leading graduate management schools, has launched a nationwide, two-year communications campaign

that suggests minority undergraduate students and graduates already in the work force consider the Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree.

Judith Goodman, chair of the GMAC's Minority Projects Coordinating Committee and Director of Admissions and Student Services for the Graduate School of Business Administration at the University of Michigan, notes that the first phase of the outreach campaign focused on identifying the causes for the declining number of Blacks and Hispanics who apply for admission and complete MBA programs.

"Interviews conducted with Blacks and Hispanics in five cities across the country revealed that minority students were concerned about issues such as the decisiveness of test scores and GPAs in the selection process, lack of information about what jobs are available with an MBA, and the

availability of financial aid,"
Goodman said.

"Despite the misconceptions held by students, follow-up with alumni of graduate management programs indicates that more and more Blacks and Hispanics are achieving their career goals in the corporate and public sectors, as entrepreneurs and in their communities," said Goodman.
