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KING HOLIDAY TO BECOME **WORLD WIDE CELEBRATION**

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Speaking before the National Press Club last week, Mrs. Coretta King, widow of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., announced historic plans for the observance of the first official national legal holiday for her martyred husband, January 16, 1986.

Two weeks of activity will be conducted in Atlanta and Washington, D.C., during the memorial period, in addition to statewide and local observances. The programs are being coordinated by Federal



Holiday Commission and Martin Luther King-Violent Center for Social Change. Mrs. King also appeared later at the signing of a Freedom Letter to South Africa demanding the end of apartheid and urging a world wide non-violent action against the all white government. The annual reception for Mrs. King was

held Congressional Black Caucus 15th legislative weekend on Capitol Hill and the Washington Hilton. She elaborated on plans for the observance at this event.

The Birthday will not only become an American holiday, but an international event and a worldwide celebration in honor of the man of peace and non-violence, his widow declared before distinguished audience of journalists, national leaders and government officials.

Mrs. King linked the U.S. civil rights movement to the human rights struggles in Latin America, India and Third World countries and the anti-apartheid protest in South Africa. When nonmembers threaten to turn into violent demonstrations. Delegations from many countries will participate in the holiday celebration.

'Minority problems in the United States will never be solved without a full employment policy of four percent unemployed or less," she emphasized in focusing on the issues of poverty, racism and crime.

"This is the first holiday since George Washington's birthday to honor an individual American and the first holiday to honor a Black American, the widow declared.
