Bonanza Hi Receives Award For Energy Management

CARSON CITY-- Governor Richard Bryan will officially commend Bonanza High School for receiving the nation's highest award for leadership in energy management, the Special Recognition Award, Thursday, November 14th at 10:00 a.m. This is the first time Nevada has received this award.

This year the Clark County School District received the Governor's Award for energy innovation and was one of eight Nevada projects nominated by Bryan for the National Energy Award Program. The Special Recognition Award was presented to the Clark

graders. Then the third graders will make their own presentation to the high school juniors.

Following the classroom sharing experience, the third graders will be taken on a tour of Valley High School and served refreshments before returning to Culley.

Additional assistance will be provided by Culley principal Francie Johnson and four Valley High School parents.

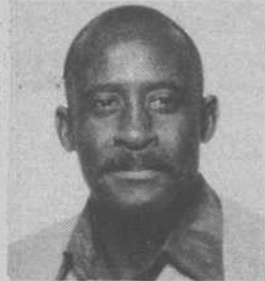

County School District on November 6th at ceremonies in Washington, D.C.

Representing the Clark County School District at the Washington, D.C. ceremonies were Tod Phelan, the District Facilities Analyst, and Carl Sullivan, the District's Mechanical Coordinator. While in Washington, the Clark County representatives were also able to meet with Department of Energy officials to discuss future grant programs.

The Bonanza High School gymnasium project, which was completed in 1984, was for the design and installation of an indirect/direct evaporative cooling system for improved heat transfer and air cooling efficiency. The district anticipates a four year payback of the initial cost, with a yearly savings of more than \$11,000.

Funding for this project was provided on a matching basis by a grant from the Governor's Office of Community Services through the Institutional Conservation Program. The Clark County School District provided all construction work and fabrication work using in-house labor as their part of the match.
