Governor Bryan Declares January 20, Dr. M.L. King's Birthday, A State Holiday

CARSON CITY - Governor Richard Bryan today joined with President Reagan, Senator Paul Laxalt and 42 other states in officially declaring January 20, 1986, the birthday of slain civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., a state holiday.


The Governor praised Las Vegas Senator Joe Neal for his tireless efforts in the 1983 and 1985 Legislature to attempt to establish King's birthday as a state holiday

Neal and members of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday Commission are planning special events, which include prayer services and parades, in honor of King's birthday.

The National Governors Association has resolved that states declaring King's birthday a state holiday, celebrate it on the national date. In keeping with this resolution, Nevada's holiday will be the third Monday of January. The Governor has the power to declare two state holidays each year

Governor Bryan says "The Reverend King deserves special recognition for his outstanding work in civil rights. The state holiday will give Nevadans a chance to reflect on the importance of the principles in which King believed and for which he died.

King, one of the early leaders in the civil rights movement, achieved national prominence in the Montgomery, Alabama bus boycott in 1955. He was born January 15, 1929 in Atlanta and was assassinated April 4, 1968.



A Reno police official suing City Councilwoman Florence Lehners for defamation has amended his complaint to include three additional causes of action.

The amendments have extended the deadline for attorneys for Lehners and the city to file a response.

Deputy Chief Lonnie Jackson claims he has suffered 'contempt and since Lehners ridicule' accused him - he says falsely - of drinking on the job. Among other things, the new complaint says the Reno charter prohibits council members from dealing directly in personnel matters.

The responses "will get filed within a week or two, attorney Robert said McQuaid, who is handling the case for the city.

The councilwoman has apologized for the remark, made last summer but is seeking Jackson unspecified monetary damages.
