Three Stage Treats Set In Reno Area For The Holidays

A cartoon adaption, the original "Storybook Christmas Tale," the classic "A Christmas Carol" and the multi-seasonal "Lilies of the Field" highlight the holiday stage treats for area theatergoers.

Whoville residents will again learn the true meaning of Christmas when Carson City's Proscenium Players present "How The Grinch Stole Christmas."

"We've adapted it from the cartoon," laughed director Carol DeMar. "I've seen it about a thousand times on videocassette."

The Dr. Seuss book and cartoon follows the evil Grinch who steals the Christmas presents of Whoville residents, inadvertently teaching them the merits of a non-materialistic holiday.

Proscenium veteran Rory Hogan will play the Grinch, joining a cast of 22 children, age 3 to 15, seven adults and a vocal ensemble which grows the ominous classic "You're A Mean One, Mr. Grinch."

The play, suitable for all ages, will be presented at the Brewery Arts Center theater Dec. 13, 14, 20 and 21 at 7

p.m., and Sunday, Dec. 15 and 22 at 2 p.m.

Tickets, available at BAC, are \$5 for adults, \$4 for students and seniors and \$3 per person for any group of five or more.

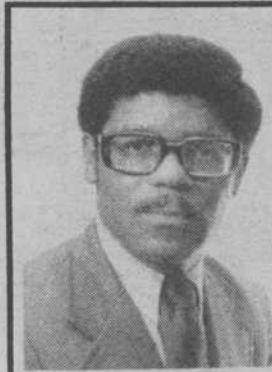

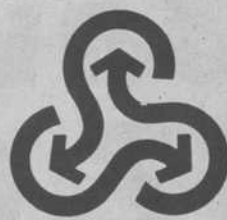
