Dr. King's birthday to be observed in school district

Martin Luther King's Birthday, which will be observed officially on Jan. 20, will be the focus of school level activities throughout the Clark County School District.

The following is a listing of some planned activities:

BELL ES — Teacher Juanita Williams, Room 42, has developed a bulletin board of students' work using the theme, ''I Had A Dream — We Have A Dream.''

HEARD ES — Students will participate in classroom activities during social studies periods Jan. 21 -Jan. 24.

RONZONE ES — Third grade students will participate in art projects, write reports, watch a film strip and make a hallway display; fourth and fifth grade students also will see the film strip about Dr. King and will make reports; K-2 students will be taught about Dr. King, who he was and what he did in his life.

MARTIN JHS — Jan. 15, morning intercom readings and bulletin board displays.

CANNON JHS — Reading class students will read

biographical material on Dr. King and the Human Relations Club will hold a special celebration in his honor.

KNUDSON JHS — Jan. 15, morning announcements will be made over the P.A. system.

GUINN JHS — A brief biography of Dr. King as a Civil Rights leader will be announced. Books and pictures commemorating Dr. King will be available for student viewing in the school library.

BURKHOLDER JHS — Each day, prior to the Jan. 20 observance, public announcements will be made telling about a major step in securing civil rights here in the U.S. Additionally, a student contest in making the most words from ''Civil Rights Movement'' will be held.

VON TOBEL JHS — A special unit on Dr. King's life will be taught in the social studies classes.

BRIDGER JHS — A twoday seminar will be held during the reading period of Jan. 14 and 15. Students will make spontaneous comments about the function of a Constitution and Bill of Rights in a democracy; how our government compares/differs to others; trials and tribulations of maintaining a democracy; resolving different types of problems: political/religion, social beliefs; social strata and the integrity of a democracy; and affects and effects of prejudices. This will take place in Luis Hout's sixth grade social studies class, room 105.

BROWN JHS — The Student Council and Human Relations Club are planning observances.

WESTERN HS — A synopsis of Dr. King's life and times will be read over the public address system and a bulletin board display will be erected.

BONANZA HS — Students will decorate a huge bulletin board in honor of King and announcements will be made over the P.A. system.

CLARK HS — Students selected a black honor student to read part of King's famous "I Have A Dream" speech over the P.A. system on Jan. 15 at 9:10 a.m. and then a specially composed birthday song for King will be played to conclude the P.A. presentation.





