family, and a third of all children born this year can expect to be on welfare by the time they reach 18.

That's because their parents don't have the jobs needed to support a family. And just cutting benefits or ending programs won't create those jobs or make those children less poor.

The idea that people will be forced to work if you get rid of welfare is false. Study after study shows that welfare recipients want to work but can't because they lack the skills to get a job or the day care facilities for their children to hold one.

It is possible that the Domestic Policy Council will come up with a realistic strategy, but advocates the poor would be a lot more confident if the task was entrusted to an independent commission made up of people experienced with the concerns of the poor.

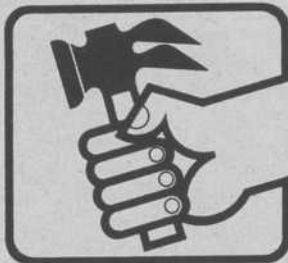

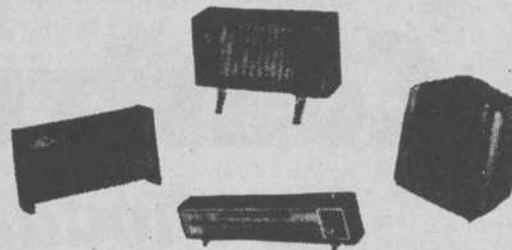

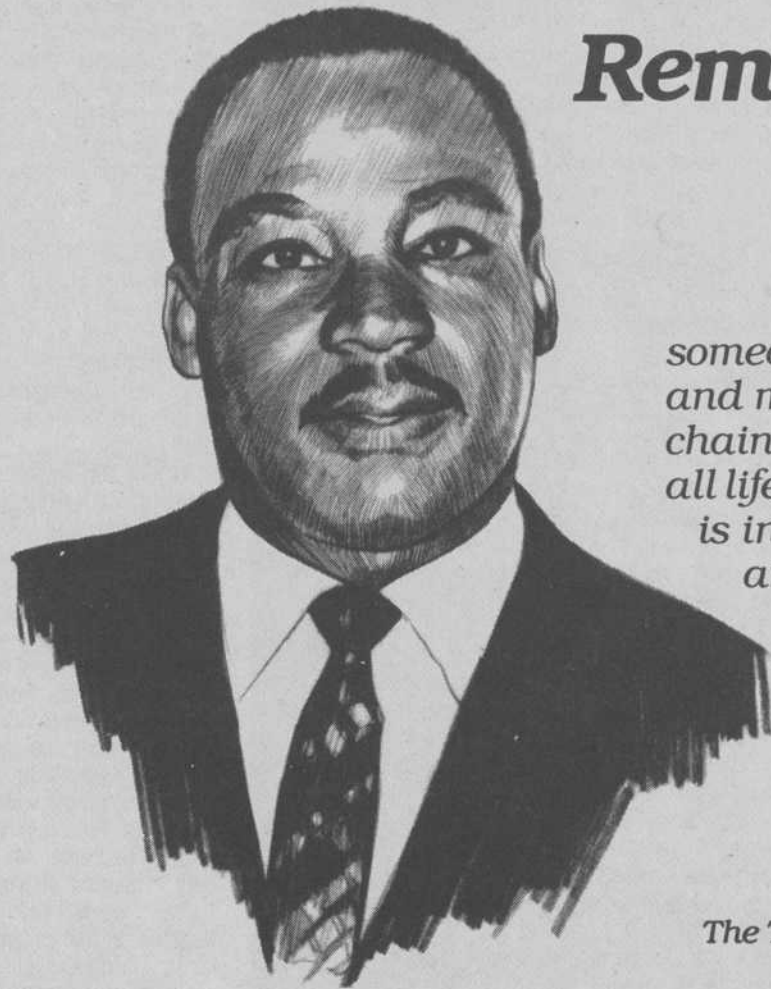
