## Maya Angelou to give lecture at UNLV

Author, historian, songwriter, and educator Maya Angelou will give a free lecture Mar. 8 at 8 p.m. in UNLV's Artemus W. Ham Concert Hall.

Titled 'Literary Expression: Continuing the Quest for Self,'' her presentation is open to the public.

A woman of many talents, Angelou has been a singer, actress, producer, editor, playwright, and lecturer. She has authored four autobiographical bestsellers, including the extremely popular ''I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings,'' and four other books of poetry.

In the 60s, at the request of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Angelou became the coordinator for the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. Although her formal education includes only a high school diploma, she has received many honorary doctorates, as well as the Chubb Fellowship

from Yale University. In 1981, she was appointed the first Reynolds Professor of American Studies at Wake Forest University.

Angelou has made more than 150 television appearances on network and local talk shows, and was the subject of an hour-long television interview by Bill Moyers on PBS. Her renowned autobiographical work, ''I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings,'' wasaired as a two-hour CBS special in 1979.

She wrote the 1983 stage play "On A Southern Journey,' and served as writer and producer for 'Sisters, Sisters'' for 20th Century Fox, her first fulllength film effort. Other television credits include the CBS mini-series "Three Way Choice," for which she was author and executive producer, and "Afro-American in the Arts" for PBS, for which she received the coveted Golden Eagle Award.

Her articles have appeared in such publications as Redbook, Cosmopolitan, and The New York Times. Angelou was accorded the Ladies Home Journal Award for ''Woman of the Year in Communication'' in 1979, and she was among the magazine's ''Top 100 most Influential Women.''

In conjunction with Angelou's lecture there will be a special Black literary exhibit on display in UNLV's James Dickinson Library through March 21.

Angelou's March 8 presentation, sponsored by UNLV and the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, is being funded in part by the Nevada Humanities Committee with transportation provided by TWA.
