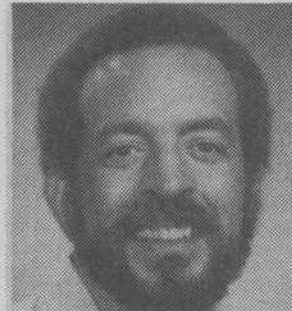

UNR Prof Chosen for NEH Summer Seminar

RENO, Nev. (UNR)--Michael S. Coray, associate professor of history at the University of Nevada-Reno, has been selected as a participant in two Summer Seminars for College Teachers, administered by the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The 12 participants for each seminar are selected on the basis of national competition. Coray was a successful applicant for "Race and Slavery in American Literature" offered by J. Sundquist at the University of California,

Berkeley, as well as for "Segregation and Race Relations: A Comparative Study of 'White Man's Colonies' and Dependent Colonies" offered by J. Cell at Duke University.

Coray chose to accept appointment at the latter seminar. He will undertake a concentrated eight-week study of comparative methodology and begin research and design for a book length investigation of the socioeconomic consequences of policies regarding land, labor and education for blacks in the postbellum American South and in the settler colonies of British East and Central Africa during the period of colonial rule.

Deans scrap over direction of school

RENO—A flap has developed at the University of Nevada Reno's College of Agriculture over Dean Bernard Jones, two associate deans and the direction of the school.

The Nevada Faculty Alliance, a teacher's organization that represents some of the instructors, is mailing a questionnaire to current and former faculty members asking if Jones, and Associate Deans Ling-Jung Koong and Elwood Miller should be retained.

The questionnaire also asks about personnel matters and whether the current policies of Jones meets the needs of Nevada

agriculture.

James Richardson, head of the Faculty Alliance, says there has been an outpouring of concern over personnel problems in the school. Opponents of Jones say there has been a large turnover since he took over three years ago.

Jones says only 10 percent of the faculty are against him and he suggests they are the unproductive ones.

"We asked these people to go to work. Many were not when I arrived. They were drawing a paycheck. They were not accessible to students," he said.

The survey should be completed in several weeks.

Nevada road death toll hits 57

CARSON CITY—The Nevada Highway Patrol says at least four persons died since last Friday in traffic accidents bringing the death toll to 57 for this year compared to 65 at the same time last year.

A 47-year-old Las Vegas man died Sunday when his car collided with another on Interstate 15 near Apex. His name withheld pending notification of relatives.

Michael Allbritton, 32, of Sparks was killed Saturday when a car he was passenger in overturned on "B" Street in Sparks.

On Friday, Janet Carpenter, 32, Verdi, died when the car she was riding in hit a power pole in Reno. And a Texas man was killed about 50 miles from Winnemucca when his car slid off the road.

Patients will sue Raleigh Hills

SPARKS—Lawyers for patients at the former Raleigh Hills hospital in Sparks say a suit will be filed this week charging the hospital abandoned the patients when it was sold.

Raleigh Hills, owned by Republic Health Corp., of Texas, ran an alcohol treatment program. But it then sold the hospital to Truckee Meadows Hospital.

The patients said their promised lifetime of treatment was stopped. Ronald Patterson, senior vice president for Republic Health, says he does not know of any lifetime contracts.

He said there were other treatment programs available to get the patient back into the community.
