## **Jazz Month Celebrated At Flamingo Library**

Jazz - the word seems to have originated in Chicago about 1914, but the music evolved from earlier Black spirituals, its rhythmic style was inherited from Ragtime, and its melodic and harmonic style was affected by the "blues." The arrival of the first gramophone records in 1917 boosted jazz's popularity and it has been growing ever since.

In Las Vegas, May is celebrated as Jazz Month. In recognition, the Las Vegas-Clark County Library District presents "Celebration of Jazz," on Saturday, May 17 at 3 p.m. at the Flamingo Library, 1401 E. Flamingo Rd

Featuring Tres Jazz, the concert offers such modern jazz pieces as "'Django'' and "Woody 'n You." Other selections include "Evedence'' by Theolonious Monk, John Coltrane's "Naima" and the concert version of "Delilah."

Comprised of local musicians, Roy James, Larry Rockwell and Stuart Aptaker, the trio is dedicated to the performance of jazz as an art form. According to Rockwell, Tres Jazz is the dream of a lifetime for us. We all have the same degree of commitment.

the groups' James. musical coordinator and drummer, admits their strong love of jazz demands the best from them. "We rehearse three and four times a week. Tunes such as " 'Django'' take that kind of preparation."

"I grew up with music," James states. "My dad was a trumpet player. An opera singer lived next door and I began playing trumpet at age two. But one day I watched a parade and that was it for me – drums!

Bassist Rockwell's professional involvement with jazz dates back to 1954 when he became affiliated with Gene Normans" "Just Jazz" series. He has played with Dizzy Gillespie, Sarah Vaughan, Zoot Sims and Woody Herman.
