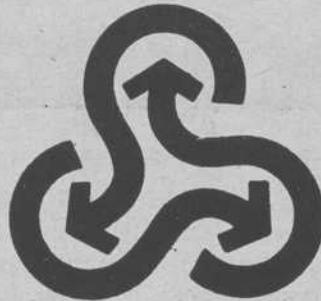

become more sophisticated politically and may look more at a candidate's qualifications than his party affiliation.

With party fidelity no longer to be taken for granted, Chaney said many blacks, though remaining registered Democrats, could cast their votes for a Republican.

"It's not enough to say anymore that we're Democrats and that Democrats stick together," Chaney said. "If I were a candidate, I'd hate to count on the black vote if I didn't come seeking it."

Larry Werner, an aide in Reid's Senate campaign, said the Democrat is not taking the Westside vote for granted. He said the recent door-to-door voter registration drive is only the first of many efforts to shore up black support.

Nonetheless, Werner said Reid views the Westside as "one of his strong suits." He estimates that the neighborhood's unregistered Democrats alone may number as high as 15,000.

"West Las Vegas is one of the places where we could have a strong showing," Werner said. "I hesitate to say it is our ace in the hole, but it's one of those areas in the valley where you can find strong Democratic support. We consider it traditionally to be our constituency."

But said Sawyer, the Clark County Republican chairman: "I think we're seeing a reversal of tradition. I see blacks supporting Republicans, and it's not so much the party going to them as it is them coming to us. I think the Democrats know they're in trouble over there."

Civil rights leader ill

The Rev. Ralph David Abernathy, a close aide to the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. during the civil rights movement, has been hospitalized after suffering a stroke.

Abernathy, 60, was admitted to Atlanta's Crawford Long Memorial Hospital Monday. Hospital spokeswoman Stephanie Stone said the former head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference was in satisfactory condition Tuesday and undergoing tests. She said he was awake and alert and the stroke was not paralyzing.

Abernathy, who was at King's side when the Nobel Peace Prize winner was shot to death in 1968, suffered a stroke in 1983 and underwent brain bypass surgery.

He was honored that same year by American black leaders as an "unsung hero" of the civil rights movement.
