A Calendar of Hispanic Fiestas

Fiesta time in Hispanic villages and towns begins in the zocalo (public square or plaza) at the church. The church and the plaza are decorated with huge amounts of flowers and candles. The people dress in very fancy costumes of many colors. There are fireworks, music and folk dances.

Here are a few of the fiestas that you'll find in some Hispanic countries during the month of July.

La Fiesta del Mar (Sea Festival) is celebrated in Santa Marta, a city on the Atlantic coast of Colombia. There are many kinds of water sports like races and water skiing. There are also street dances. Many different kinds of costumes are worn by the dancers.

6-8— A fiesta is held in honor of St. Elizabeth in the Callejon de Huaylas valley of Peru. Most of the activities center around a naval battle between Peru and Chile in a war fought in 1879 to 1883.



7-15— The Feast of St. Fermin is celebrated by the people of Comitan, a town in the Mexican state of Chiapas. This event is also called the "Festival of Lights." Beautifully decorated candles are placed around the Church of St. Fermin.

In Cuidad del Carmen (City of the Virgin of Mount Carmel), a city in the Mex-

ican state of Campeche, a very lively celebration is held each year. This is a very big fiesta. There are fireworks, all kinds of games, bullfights, water sports and a fishing contest.

The Feast of the Virgin of Carmel is celebrated in Cartagena in Colombia, too. There is a beautiful and colorful procession that lasts all day.

The Virgin of Carmel is the patron saint of many villages and towns in Peru. On July 16, rites are held in the fields to purify the earth. The great fairs of southern Peru also begin on this day.
