She later established her own beauty shop business and also became the first black radio disc jockey in Southern Nevada.

Her activity within the Las Vegas community earned her a position on the Clark County Hospital Board, with which she served for several years. She was also an active member of the Las Vegas chapter of the National Association for Advancement of Colored People.

Her social activities included membership with the Elks Lodge and the Eastern Star Masonic lodge.

Florence Elmore was born in Aug. 1908. The eldest of six (6) children born to Benjamin and Mae Elmore in Des Moines, Iowa. received her education and early training as a beautician in that city. The family later moved to Los Angeles when she opened her first beauty salon in 1942.

Florence, her mother Mae and sister Dorothy moved and settled in Las Vegas. She became the 1st black licensed cosmetologist in the State of Nevada and for a number of years owned and operated one of the largest beauty salons in Las Vegas. Also, during this time, she was engaged with other family members in owning and operating restaurants in the Cotton Club, Swanky Club, Carver Park, the Groove, Town Tavern and finally the Chili Pot.
