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Philip Morris Gives \$75,000 to NAACP at Baltimore Convention

BALTIMORE, MD — Benjamin L. Hooks, Executive Director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) received the Association's highest award — The Spingarn Medal — during the closing session of the Association's largest annual convention in its 77-year history.

Moments before, Stanley S. Scott, Vice President and Director of Corporate Affairs, Philip Morris Companies Inc., handed Hooks a check for \$75,000 to help underwrite the relocation of the NAACP's offices from New York to Baltimore, where the Association recently purchased its first permanent headquarters. A third of the grant was from The General Foods Corporation, a subsidiary of

Philip Morris Companies Inc.

The convention brought more than 5,100 delegates and observers into the beautifully restored Baltimore downtown/harbor district, and an average of 22,000 visitors a day to the Association's Commerce and Industry Show at the Baltimore Convention Center.

A highlight of the pre-convention activities was the Philip Morris Companies Inc. reception featuring Miller Brewing Company's "Gallery of Greats: 20th Century Black Political Firsts." The Gallery featured 13 portraits painted by artist Clarence Laudric Shivers.

Vice President Bush and United States Senators Paul Sarbanes and Charles Mathias were among the many convention speakers, as were Maryland's Governor Harry Hughes, Lieutenant Governor of Virginia, L. Douglas Wilder, and Baltimore's Mayor William Schaefer.

Edward W. Brooke, the former Senator from Massachusetts and himself a Spingarn Medalist, presented the NAACP's 71st Spingarn Medal to Hooks.

The Medal was established in 1914 by the late J.E.

Spingarn, "to be awarded for the highest and noblest achievement by an American Negro during the preceding year or years." A nine-member committee, appointed by the NAACP board, chooses the awardee.

Scott told the enthusiastic audience, gathered for the Freedom Fund Awards Dinner at the Hyatt Regency Inner Harbor Hotel, that he was doubly proud to undertake, "this pleasant chore — first as an alumnus of the NAACP staff and second as a representative of the NAACP's long-time friend and supporter Philip Morris."

Scott said, "Commitment and attention to community needs were what enabled this organization to play a major role in the civil rights movement. I count myself lucky to have been part of your work for one of the most momentous expansions of human dignity and human rights in the history of this country."

Scott worked in the NAACP's public relations department with the late Henry Lee Moon prior to joining the WINS Radio news staff. He later served as Special Assistant to President Ford.
