The members of this Local Unit already have started working to encourage the District of Columbia school system to utilize AOIP's unique compensatory motivational tools.

Gerald Inman, Omega Psi Phi Fraternity (Bronx, New York), is president of the Bronx Local Unit. Under his leadership, the members of this unit have focussed initially on organizing Public Information, Interorganizational Liaison and War Chest Committees in order to maximize the involvement locally of all AOIP organizations so that the other seven committees can be speedily developed.

He emphasized the need for organizing when he told a New York group, "...Until we organize we will remain as fragmented programs."

Elizabeth Munnings, Zeta Phi Beta Sorority (West Palm Beach, Florida), is president of the West Palm Beach Local Unit. Under her leadership, this unit has formed all ten committees and has been successful in fund raising. Recently, the West Palm Beach Local Unit donated substantially more than 25 percent of their earnings to the national body. Recently, Mrs. Munnings was instrumental in helping to organize the Local Unit in Jacksonville, Florida.

Georgia Sanders, Zeta Phi Beta Sorority (Baton Rouge, Louisiana), has been very active throughout Louisiana as former state coordinator helping Monroe and Shreveport to get organized. Currently, she is serving as the president of the Baton Rouge Local Unit.


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President Williamson says the Central Oklahoma Division believes that "minorities...will assess their own capabilities and take affirmative action to move from a situation of despair to a positive degree of hope.... At the same time," he says, "we realize these goals are ambitious and could be difficult to accomplish overnight."

However, as a second step, the Central Oklahoma Division has established June 1987 as a target date to incorporate Oklahoma cities and towns with minority populations of 500 and over as AOIP affiliates.

"Our commitment to eradicate illiteracy will serve as motivation to continue seeking solutions beyond traditional approaches," Williamson adds.
