EFNEP's TEEN PRE-NATAL PROGRAM helps lowincome teen mothers like Susan have a healthy pregnancy and build a better baby. The pilot program, an off-shoot Nevada of Cooperative Extension's Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP), has helped more than 55 young women since it's inception just eight months ago. The series of inhome nutrition lessons places these girls in an atmosphere of encouragement and self-

Adolescent pregnancy is routinely considered high Congenital defect, obstetric complication and prematurity are typical In addition, problems. disproportionately large numbers of low birth weight babies -- infants weighing less than 5.5 pounds -- are born to adolescent mothers.
