--The NAACP Executive Committee Purges Itselt--

While in executive session on Tuesday night, August 5, in the branch office located at 940 W. Owens, the Las Vegas Branch NAACP voted unanimously to enforce Article IV Section 6-B, which states any member of the **Executive Committee or any** standing or special committee, who shall be from three absent consecutive meetings notice without explanations or who shall not perform the required duties for three consecutive months, shall be removed by

the Executive Committee. A member of any standing or special committee may be directly removed by the chairman for dereliction of duty. After a lengthy discussion on the matter, the Executive Committee finally came to grips with the problem of non-attendance and non-functioning committee members for the last year and one half of this administration. The seven members dropped from the committee will be notified by mail.

--NAACP Urges South African Sanction From U.S. Senators--

Dr. Benjamin Hooks, the Executive Director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, is directing twenty two hundred branches, college chapters and youth councils in the United States of America, to send mailagrams to their United States Senators to vote for economic sanctions against South Africa. The Las Vegas branch NAACP complied with the directive by sending mailgrams to U.S. Senators Paul Laxalt and Chic Hecht. Both of their replies said in part that progress is being made toward meaningful change but they were against economic sanctions, because it would hurt the Blacks, the through most unemployment. The NAACP rebutted to this line of thinking is that the basic human freedoms are more important than things such as gold, silver, diamonds

and as oil. If America had followed the Senators thinking, we would still be a subject of Great Britain.

Nev. jobless rate drops: at 6-year low

CARSON CITY — For the fourth consecutive month, Nevada's unemployment rate dropped and it is at its lowest level in more than six years.

The state Employment Security Department reported Tuesday the jobless rate was 6.1 percent in June with an estimated 31,200 people out of work.

It's lower than the 6.2 percent in May and the 7.1 percent national unemployment in June.

There were 464,400 jobs in June, up 1,100 from May.
