Higher Education Fees Headed for College

N'ROCHELLE, N.Y.—To the wise education is not obligatory beyond a certain age, but is a rare privilege. Though, beyond elementary school level, it is very expensive. None-the-less, even when foolishly spent by those who run the system, education is worth every cent. Be that as it may the cost of higher education throughout the more than 3000 colleges and universities in our land is going up for the '86/'87 academic season. The info is straight from figures compiled by the College Scholarship Service, the financial aid of the college board. Should the desire touch you to send a child, or children, to Booker T. Washington in Alabama, the tuition fees are still locked in

at \$2,340 each. It's another story if they're making it to Stillman which has increased its fees by \$234 to spell a total of \$2,340. Talladega has also held its fee line at the '85/'86 level of \$2,909. Tuskegee has upped its tuition fees \$400 above the '85/'86 level for a total \$4,200. Moving away from the historical Black colleges the main campus of the University of Alabama carries a tuition dollar mark of \$1,254 if you're a statesider. The out of state fee is an additional \$1,436. At the University of California that currency figure is doubled to a whopping \$4,086 if you have to cross a border to be educated in the state that Mayor Tom Bradley should be governor of. If you like the state, and have proper grades, you can enroll at the John F. Kennedy U. for \$4,407 and not be financially penalized as a transplant. If you live in the state of Illinois the Chgo based Kennedy-King or Malcolm X Colleges will start you on the road to higher education for \$730 and proper credits.

Morgan State in Maryland also stayed the course with its last season fee of \$1,484 with the same additional for out of state. To seek a degree at Spelman you need \$4,470 in tuition cash. \$3,960 will get you off and studying at Morris Brown. If your parents are loaded, or a lotto winner, you may have an eye for the highest tuition fees listed in the report. If it's Sarah Lawrence the cost is \$11,625. Princeton demands \$11,780, Amherst, \$11,141, Brown U., the late Fritz Pollard's alma mater, tuition tag is \$12,035 and Bennington College in Vermont is \$13,970. No you don't get a building with your diploma.
