

NBN'S Night Talk Calls For National Black Agenda For '87

The National Black Network and the Young Black Programmers Coalition join forces to produce Agenda '87. A twenty hour special series of NBN's national call-in talk show, Night Talk, Agenda '87 will be a unique broadcast experience which will examine methods toward Black empowerment. Agenda '87 will reach out to audiences from Los Angeles to Washington D.C., from Baton Rouge to Brooklyn, with national and local leaders, establishing nationwide open forums that will provide ideas, information and input towards the development of a Black political, economic, and personal agenda for 1987.

Agenda '87 will be moderated by Night Talk host, Bob Law. Beginning on December 7th, it will be broadcast every Sunday night in December at twelve midnight E.S.T. The participants for Agenda '87 will be drawn from a cross section of Black American leadership - opinion-makers, business leaders, social activists and thought-provoking intellectuals, in addition to call-in comments from listeners.

In succeeding weeks, Agenda '87 will focus on 1) Political Development, 2) Economic Development, 3) Youth and Education, 4) The Black Family and Relationships.

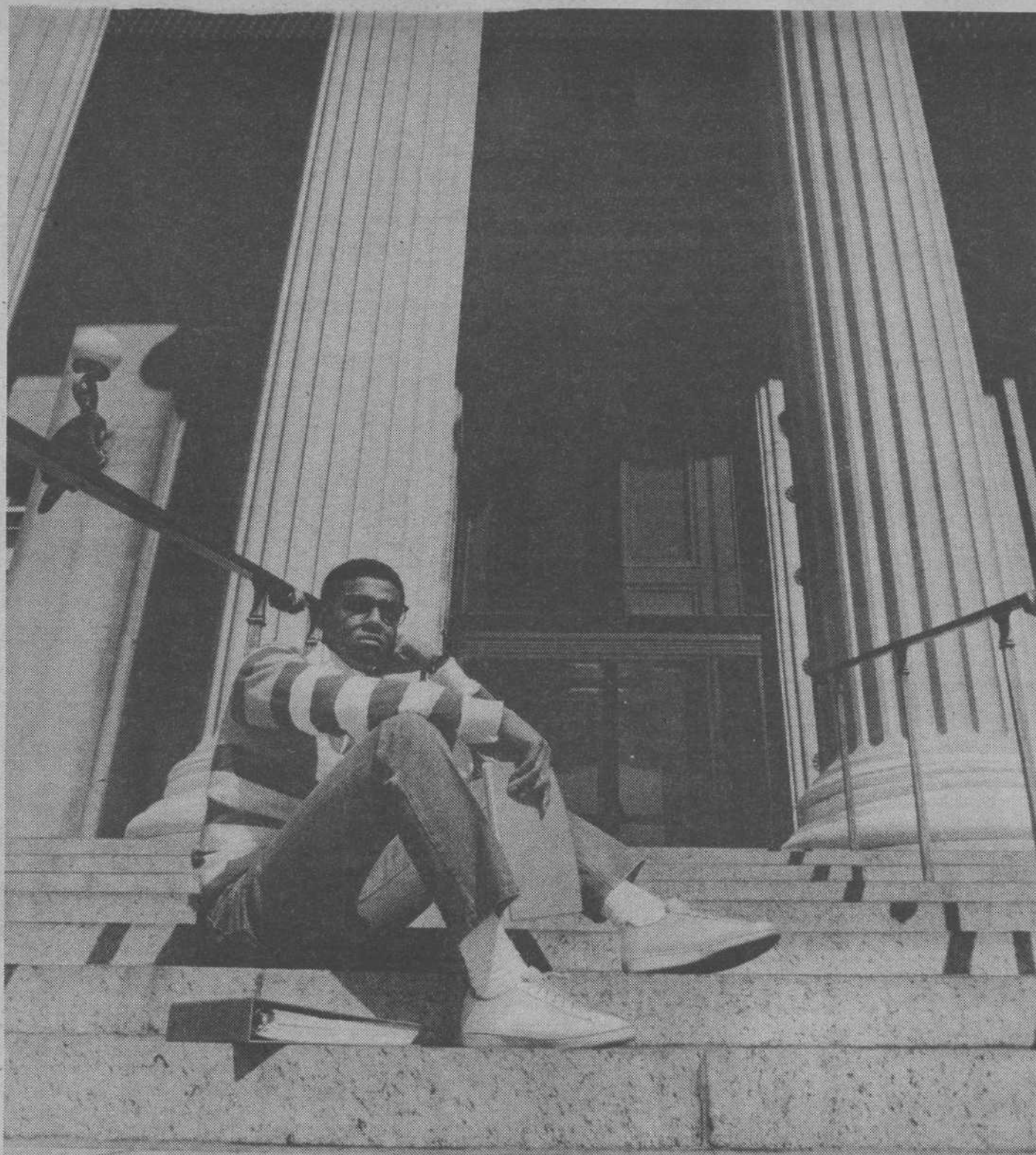
