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
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WHAT IS HAPPENING NATIONALLY

To Complete The Unfinished Work of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

The Assault On Illiteracy Program (AOIP) is a networking coalition of organizations engaged in an overall community-building approach to addressing the root causes of illiteracy among Black and similarly-situated minorities. In essence they are committed to the rebuilding of our communities into such secure, productive, valueladen and hope-filled entities that everyone will be motivated to want to learn and lead responsible lives. AOIP has a redemptive mission of completing the "unfinishing work of the late Dr. Martin Luther King Jr." And, information listed below about your organization should (as best possible) be focused on what your group is doing to help complete that "unfinished work."

Current AKA projects include "Moving Up From Poverty," a series of programs which empower Blacks in con-texts which influence economic development, health care, 'job training and education; the Educational Advancement Foundation, which provides grants, fellowships and schol ships for educational study and research; the Cleveland Job Corps Center, which provides structural vocational training for high school dropouts; travel grants, providing expense-paid educational tours for high school essay winners and college scholarship recipients; and Leadership Fellows, which consists of structured training in leadership development, followed by internships with national leaders.
