-- NAACP Sunday Observed--

Last Sunday, Pastor S. Eugene Winn of First AME Church became the first pastor and church in Las Vegas to observe NAACP Sunday during 1987. Our prayer is that every Black pastor in Clark County will select a Sunday in his or her church to encourage every member to join or rejoin the NAACP. With a population of more than 50,000 Black people, a goal of 2000 NAACP members should be very easy to reach.

-- The Nevada's Voter League--

Every Thursday at 5:30 p.m., the Voter's League meets at 940 W. Owens Preparations are Avenue. being made to register a large number of the 30,000 unregistered Blacks in Clark County before Jesse Jackson returns to Las Vegas early in April. -- Black People Are In Trouble Again--

Someone has written and I quote, "Those who fail to remember the past. are subject to repeat it." The period twelve year immediately following

January 1, 1863 was known Reconstruction as The Period, when Blacks had and exercised all the rights that white men had. Then there was the Hayes/Tilden Compromise, where the South agreed to give up the presidency of the United States in exchange to have the peace keeping troops removed from the South. 50% of all the people in prison in Nevada are Black and 90% of that 50% are Black males. It costs the state \$25,000 each annually to keep them in prison and \$5,000 each annually to educate them. Two more prisons are under construction, just in case they are needed. A Black nineteen year old basketball player named Daniels wants to go to college, but can't read. This suggests that there are other Blacks in Daniels' condition. Blacks are the last hired and the first fired. Blacks are terminated for the smallest offense, while whites are allowed to keep their jobs, after breaking rules that everybody knows about.

-- Blacks Need Another **Harriet Tubman** Railroad--

Harriet Tubman led her people during the Civil War from Southern salvery to Northern freedom. She had a route known as the Underground Railroad and she had stops along the way, known as stations. At each station she had people, whites and Blacks, known as

conductors to help her along the way. Blacks must be taught how to read and write, how to register to vote, and to vote on election day. To teach their children at home, before they go to church or To respect and support one another.

-- NAACP Entertains Black High School Leaders--

The NAACP has invited the Black leaders and counselors from 15 high schools to be its guest at a reception in the Branch Office, 940 W. Owens on Sunday, March 8 at 4:00 p.m. The purpose of this meeting is to allow these youths and their counselors to get acquainted with some of the Black adults in the community. The NAACP has scholarship opportunities and encouragement to offer to these young people. The adults who attend this meeting are encouraged to make this a Pot Luck affair.

-- NAACP Needs Volunteers--

Like all other organizations the NAACP must have the strength and support if it is going to grow. This strength and support comes only from people through membership participation. Volunteers are needed to write memberships on their friends, families. acquaintances and associates, including churches, social, political economical organizations. Typists and receptionists are needed also

To combat bigotry and injustice today requires tactics that will address the profound economic changes that have had an adverse impact on all of America's poor, although unquestionably blacks have felt that impact more. Boycotting white businesses that serve blacks is not the answer. Nor is marching in an all-white town that is segregated, nor by law, but by tradition. While such protests may breifly focus media attention on a particular situation, they have little long-term impact.

As long as the government fails to offer an economic and social agenda that will help all Americans, racism. intolerance and ethnic stereotyping will increase. As long as the Administration ignores the plight of the poor underclass and as long as some civil rights leaders insist on special agenda for black poverty rather than for poverty in general, the fires

commended Assembly Minority Leader Lou Bergevin, R-Gardnerville, for getting the King holiday bill out of the committee in 1985 when he chaired Government Affairs. The bill was then approved by the Republicancontrolled Assembly but died on a split vote in the Senate Government Affairs Committee. The Democrats had the majority in the Senate.

Although the Assembly is controlled this year by the Democrats, with the GOP in power in the Senate, Brookman asked Assembly Republicans to "urge the Senate not to kill it this time.
