## Claiborne two-steps for UNR

Kevin Claiborne is unique among current University of Nevada-Reno athletes.

He plays two sports.

Claiborne, a 1985 graduate of Hug High School, is a wide receiver on the football team and a sprinter on the track team. That makes March and April a busy time.

The Wolf Pack football team is holding spring drills, which conflict with track practice. Claiborne can't be two places at once, but he must serve two coaches at the same time.

Although he attends UNR on a football scholarship, coach Chris Ault promised Claiborne he could also run track.

I've had about a handful of kids participate in both," said Ault, who has coached the Pack for 11 years. "I wouldn't let a quarterback do it or certainly a new player that we just recruited do it. But in Kevin's case, it's working out well."

Claiborne, a 5-foot-8, 150-pound sophomore who is nicknamed "Flea", is the first UNR football player to run track since Jack DeMello in 1982.

#### Fred Little, Jr. Finished Fifth in NCAA Wrestling Championships

COLLEGE PARK, Md. — Fresno State senior Fred Little, Jr., a former AAA state champion from Carson High School, finished fifth in the 177-pound weight class at the NCAA wrestling championships on Saturday.

Little, who finished eighth last year as a 167-pounder, missed a rematch with the wrestler who ousted him from the championship bracket, fifth-seeded Reggie Wilson of Chicago State.

Wilson, who injured a knee in Friday night's semi-finals, was clearly hampered by the injury in a Saturday consolation match. He subsequently defaulted the rematch with Little.

"Fifth place is better than going home without anything," said Little, an NCAA All-American for the second year in a row. "I still would have hoped to do better, but that's the way it goes."

Little won two matches Thursday to reach the semi-finals, where he lost 9-7 to Wilson. Saturday, with a shot at third place up for grabs, Little lost 5-4 to third-seeded Dan Mayo of Penn

## GOVERNOR HAILS PASSAGE OF HIGHWAY ACT

CARSON CITY — Governor Richard Bryan today hailed the action of Congress in overriding the President's veto of the \$88 billion Highway Funding Act.

Governor Bryan said, "I am delighted with the news. This timely act of Congress makes it possible for several of Nevada's badly needed highway projects to go forward this construction season. It will also mean jobs for thousands of Nevadans."

Southern Nevadans will see work beginning on the east leg of the U.S. 95 freeway and northern Nevadans, the U.S. 395 extension, within the next few months. Nevada's share of the highway bill will be \$70.4 million per year for the next five years. In addition, the state will receive \$4.3 million per year for the Sparks Boulevard interchange, the Boulder Highway beautification project and the Sahara Avenue interchange.

Motorists will begin seeing the 65 mph signs on Interstate 15 and Interstate 80, the only roads in Nevada affected by the increased speed limit, within the next two weeks.

Nevada'' is a new project sponsored by the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs, University of Nevada, Las Vegas. Its purpose is to provide a forum for fiction writers in Nevada and to demonstrate that a body of literature is being produced in the state.
