# **SCHOOL TALK** By Dr. Marshall C. Darnell

With the close of school rapidly approaching many parents have made inquiries about the summer school programs that are regularly conducted by the Clark County School District. Three different programs will be offered this year, an elementary program for students in grades K-6, a secondary program for students enrolled in grades 7-12, and a handicapped program which will be conducted at Variety School.

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The elementary program has a tuition fee of \$70 and offers classes in:

1. Kindergarten, which is designed to provide reading and math experiences for children who are now enrolled in the kindergarten program,

2. Remedial instruction. for those children who are recommended by their present teachers to receive additional training in reading and/or math,

3. Resource room, which is a special class to be established if a sufficient number of students enroll. and

4. Enrichment courses in computer/creative writing, puppetry and language arts, bookmaking, musicmovement and drama, art. shadow puppets-musicculture, and video productions.

Parents can obtain additional information about the programs and registration dates by contacting Janice Bennington at 799-7911. If you have given thought to having your child attend the elementary program the dates and times are listed as

June 22 through July 30, 1987. Students would be attending class from 8 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. on each of the regularly scheduled instructional days.

The program for students in grades 7-12 will be conducted at four locations; Basic High School, Las Vegas High School, Rancho High School, and Western High School. The cost for the secondary program will be \$70 for each one-half credit. Registration for the secondary program will be conducted on June 17-18, 1987. Scheduled classes will begin on June 22nd and extend through August 5, 1987. Additional information about the secondary program can be obtained by calling 799-5477

Variety School will host a special program for the handicapped student. There are a number of provisions that must be followed for admission to this program and interested parents should contact their student's current school for information or call Dr. Donald McHenry at 799-5471 for a response to any question.

The Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 mandates that employers must take immediate action to achieve compliance regarding verifying, documenting, and attesting to every employee's employment eligibility if hired after November 6, 1986.
