programs that were won because of the Black upheavals of the 60's. Blaming "foreigners" serves to distract us from the real target - Reagan's policies that consistently place the military and defense spending over human needs, an Administration that cannot find work for millions of people, house the homeless, or feed the hungry. An Administration that has simultaneously encouraged the rise of neo-Nazis and the KKK from Howard Beach to Forsyth County.

One example of how this lack of distinction can lead directly to anti-Asian violence was the 1982 killing of Vincent Chin in Detroit. You mention in you article, "we must never forget that Detroit, once a beacon of hope for the Black worker, has been made into a wasteland of unemployment by the soaring sales of Japanese and other foreign cars." We do not agree that Japanese cars brought unemployment to Detroit. The U.S. auto companies did, in their drive for more and more profits. They fled to exploit the cheap labor markets overseas; they have invested billions in Japanese car companies (for example, Chrysler Corporation owns one-third of Mitsubishi, yet has the audacity to trumpet "Buy American" cars!); and closed hundreds of plants in the Midwest, only to re-open them again (non-union, of course) in the South.

Vincent Chin, a Chinese American was brutally beaten to death. Two white, unemployed autoworkers, mistaking him for being Japanese, blamed their joblessness on him. They chased him for hours through the streets of Detroit, finally caught up with him, and while one held him down, the other bashed his head in with a baseball bat. Their punishment? Three years probation and a \$3000 fine each! The public ourtage from Asian Americans, other minorities, justiceminded individuals and organizations from all over the country, brought national attention to the case and forced the U.S. Justice Department to file federal charges. The case only recently settled.

Current studies show that incidents of anti-Asian violence and racism are on the rise, from Boston, New Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Louisiana, Detroit and all along the West Coast. Not a few of these involve Asians and Blacks. It is one of the uglier side effects of capitalist society when one minority is pitted against another, targeted and scrapegoated for all of society's economic ills. The real culprits are sitting back and encouraging this racist sentiment and violence, in order to prevent us from uniting and fighting for our

Several legislators, such as Sen. Bill O'Donnell, R-Las Vegas, and Sen. Ray Rawson, R-Las Vegas, made emotionally charges speeches in favor of the King holiday.

O'Donnell, at 36 the youngest senator, related how, as a young soldier, he and friends of all races visited the motel in Memphis, Tenn., where King had been assassinated in 1968.

"With this holiday, it may not be the end of bigotry and hatred but it is a memorial, a symbol of a man who laid his life down like some of my friends did for the freedom of others," O'Donnell said.

Rawson told how Neal's perserverance had convinced him to support the King holiday bill.

"I come from a heritage of people who were pushed across the country and lost home after home," said Rawson, a Mormon. "I know what prejudice is. Through Sen. Neal's eyes, I began to appreciate the sacrifice and the injustice and finally the accomplishments of Martin Luther King."

While humbled by such comments, Neal still sees lingering vestiges of racism See NEAL, Page 13
