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Year-Round School Registration Set

Official registration will begin May 11 for elementary students to be enrolled in year-round schools during the 1987-88 school year. It is important for students to register early to be given priority consideration for assignments. Classes begin August 4 for year-round schools.

Students currently attending year-round schools will receive an information letter and school year calendar by mail. Families new to the area and those with kindergarten students should call the CCSD Zoning office, 799-5268, to determine if their school assignment is to a year round school.

A certified birth certificate and proof of immunization are required for students new to Nevada and for all kindergarten students. First grade students who have not previously been enrolled in kindergarten must also produce a birth certificate and immunization records.

Summer School Registration Begins

Students are now registering for elementary and secondary summer school classes, which will begin June 22.

Elementary summer school will be held June 22 through July 30 from 8 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday at 17 Clark County elementary schools. Registration deadline is June 12.

Summer school for junior and senior high school students will be held June 22 through August 5 at Western, Rancho, Las Vegas and Basic High Schools. Deadline for registration is May 22.

The cost for attending elementary summer school is \$70 per student. Junior and senior high summer school cost is \$70 per class with a two class maximum.
