At Trinity United Church of Christ Chicago, in parishoners line up 90 minutes early just to get a seat. By 8 a.m. the building is filled with people who are mostly young, upwardly mobile, and black.

On the other side of the city, in a rundown storefront. the New Rising Sun Missionary Baptist Church is only half filled. Many of the faithful here are unemployed women and their children.

These two black churches are examples of a diverse institution that share a common legacy. From its earliest days of secret slave meetings to its central role in the Civil Rights Movement, the Black Church has served as an instrument of liberation for its people.

"Keeping the Faith," a FRONTLINE with Judy Woodruff documentary airing Tuesday, June 16 at 9 pm (check local listings), examines the current status of the Black Church in FRONTLINE America. Correspondent Roger Wilkins travels to Chicago to find out whether the Black Church is

fulfilling its legacy. In Chicago, Wilkins learns that middle class blacks are returning to the church in increasing numbers - coming back to their spiritual and cultural foundations. In many of the fastest-growing churches they are asserting pride in being black. Trinity Church, which has grown from 87 members to 4,500 in 15 years, bears the motto Unashamedly Black, Unapologetically Christian."

"Keeping the Faith" explores the power of Trinity Church. Through its pastor Jeremiah Wright, its musicfilled worship services and its many ministries - from the "Building Black Men Program'' to the ''Sojourner Truth Cultural Classes'' the image of a vital institution emerges.

"What I found at Trinity was a coming together of my blackness and my Christianity,'' says one member.

"You see black folks of all economic status because they're all worshipping the Lord," adds another, "It makes me feel good. It makes me feel we're going to get together... and it makes me feel even prouder of being black.

Many of Trinity's members are part of the growing black middle class. But while this portion of the black community has grown, so has the percentage of those living

in poverty. Unlike Trinity, the church across town, the Rising Sun Missionary Baptist Church. displays no picture of a black Jesus. Its pastor, Reverend Cleveland Whittington, strives to help the young people in one of Chicago's poorest neighborhoods.

'Most churches are not interested in the poor," says Trinity's Pastor Wright. "In 1987 most churches are status quo. They are not trying to feed the poor; they are not trying to find jobs for people.

The Rising Sun Church is trying to work with the lowest, the least, and the left out. But it is an uphill battle. As Pastor Wright says, "Historically, the church has been one of the biggest 'boat rockers.' When you look at the numbers, and look at the facilities they have, and look at the potential for what they could be doing, they're not doing it, we're not doing it, no.'

"Will churches and individual blacks reach beyond their membership, beyond their successful lives to
