## MASONS.....

By the 1870's the National Compact was officially dead, but the negative effects of this "experiment" lingered on for many, many years. It left a legacy of "false" Grand Masters who claimed to have legitimate Masonic power to establish lodges. Lodges so constituted came to be known as "Clandestine Masonry."

Today, the state Grand Masters meet once a year in an advisory, non-official body known as the Conference of Grand Masters.

## Who Was and Is Who Among Prince Hall Masons

HIS "very partial" list also includes "Who Was Who Among Prince Hall Masons." Such a list is not easy to compile, for as one Masonic historian observed, "How can Black historians write our history without including Prince Hall Masons, identified as such. In one state history of Black Americans, he estimated that approximately 90 percent of all the adults portrayed are Prince Hall Masonic members.
