PRIDE IN DIXIE: — The 102nd Annual Commencement Exercises of Tuskegee U. (formerly Tuskegee Institute) provided the setting for a day that will long be remembered as a milestone in which Tuskegee Airmen played a major role. President Ronald Reagan, invoking the memories of pioneer Black scientists and educators, urged the graduating class of the Univ. to "remember the racial struggles of the past as it continues the moral battle against intolerance and racial hatred." A record crowd of over 5,000 greeted the President enthusiastically and applauded vigorously when he proclaimed pride in his honorary membership in Tuskegee Airmen, recalling vividly the fact that he had narrated a WWII documentary on Tuskegee Airmen.

The President's own accurate review of the heroic record made by Tuskegee Airmen was a fitting companion piece to his observation that General Chappie James "had four stars on his shoulder and 50 stars in his heart." "Chappie" he continued, "was an unabashed patriot. His expressions of affection and dedication to the cause of freedom stirred the hearts of his countrymen." Reagan said that James and other Blacks who served in a segregated military "undoubtedly helped bring an end to this outrage." The James Center, a three story, 125,000 square-foot complex will house the nation's only aerospace engineering program at a predominantly African-American university. President Reagan in his dedication remarks suggested that the agricultural advances of Tuskegee's past may be surpassed by its future aviation innovations... The Bill Cosby show dialed out the season a Neilson topper with a commanding 53% audience share. That's a whole lot of eyes/ears...
