L.V. City Council Voted to **Rename Highland Drive in** Honor of Dr. King

The Las Vegas City Council on Wednesday afternoon met to consider renaming Highland Drive in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

The Council approved the plan to rename a portion of the street after King. That portion will extend from Carey Avenue to Oakey Blvd.

The Council made their decision on the basis of the results of surveys sent out by the Council. The plan will undergo a 5-year phase-in

An earlier survey conducted of Highland property

owners and businessmen showed that about 52 percent of the property owners and about 43 percent of the business operators either favored the name change or failed to respond to the sur-

The survey was worded to let people know that a failure to respond would be counted as a vote in favor of the name change. The majority of the 'favorable' votes were the result of failures to respond. Some of the surveys were returned as undeliverable.
