Gilliam, Banks & Graham Drafted To The NBA

Monday afternoon Armon Gilliam was a very happy man. The NBA draft had just been completed and, yes, Gilliam was one of the 161 players drafted. As a matter of fact, he was chosen in the first round, in the top ten, one of the first few picked. Okay! He was the second player taken in the 1987 NBA Draft.

Yes, that's right, Gilliam, who led the UNLV Runnin' Rebels to a 37-2 record and a final four appearance this past season, was chosen second by the Phoenix Suns. The San Antonio Spurs, with the first pick of the draft, took Navy Center David Robinson.

"Armon Gilliam will be a much better player in the pro game than in college," said Sun's General Manager Jerry Colangelo.


Armon had no idea where he would be drafted; he just "had to wait and see." Gilliam should receive a salary in the neighborhood of \$500,000 a year.

Guards Freddie Banks and Gary Graham were also chosen in the draft. Banks was the first pick in the second round (26th overall) by the Detroit Pistons. Graham was the 126th pick overall in the sixth round by the Indiana Pacers.


Sunday evening the Suns traded Forward Ed Pickney and Center William Bedford in separate deals. That indicated that they would lean toward Armon. Phoenix had been contemplating between Gilliam and Ohio State guard Dennis Hopson. Hopson was taken after Gilliam (3rd overall) by the New Jersey Nets.

'Although the Detroit Pistons wanted to draft a tall guard (6'7'' - 6'9'') they went "for the best guard available." Fitting that title was Las Vegas' own Freddie Banks. Freddie was the Pistons' first pick in the draft. He said he isn't worried about the fact that they already have three outstanding guards - Isaiah Thomas, Joe Dumars and Vinnie Johnson. He says, "I just want to go out there and show them I can contribute. I'm very happy to go to Detroit.'' Director of Scouting for Detroit Stan Novack believes Freddie has a good chance to make the


The G-Man, Gary Graham, like any other sixth-round pick, might find it tough making it on a NBA team.

severely damaged his knee in his Freshman year at UNLV. Eldridge was expected by some to be drafted by the Los Angeles Clippers.


