responsibility will be to run whatever experiments or activities have to go on during that particular mission.

When asked if she would be interested in being a doctor on a space platform and staying up there for four or five years, she replied, "I would be interested in it, yes. That's one of the possibilities of what might happen to a person who's in the astronaut corps."

The youngest of three children (she has an older brother and sister), Jemison feels that her parents have been the biggest influence so far in her life. "Parents are always extremely important," she says. "Mine allowed me to develop into who I am and yet provided enough guidance to keep me from doing something totally off the wall. But it was never pushing me one way or the other, which I think has been very valuable. They showed me that confidence, then I started to develop some confidence in myself and yet, at the same

time, they were critical. When I did something wrong, I had to be responsible for it."

When she's not treating patients or applying for

astronaut programs, Jemison enjoys reading, especially spy novels and documentary novels on history and economics. She also likes to dance, listen to music, go to museums and travel.

qualified Black applicants. It may just be that the problem has been allowed to exist simply because there has not been an active effort to correct it. Blacks are interested in and are capable of doing more than helping to elect candidates, we are also interested in and capable of helping them govern."

Ralph Neas, executive director of the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights said, "The top echelons of the Justice Department constitute one of the most segregated work forces in the country."

Neas points out that Attorney General Ed. Meese and Assistant Attorney General of Civil Rights, Bradford Reynolds, are this Administration's chief architects of the anti-affirmative action policy. Neas states that Meese-Reynolds' brand of affirmative action illustrates results of what would happen if it becomes the law of the land. Because of their screening a very few women and minorities have been selected for federal judgeships or United States attorney positions. Out of the 298 federal judges appointed by the Reagan Administration in his six years of office, only five are Black. Of the 93

U.S. attorneys appointed, only two are Black. In contrast, the Carter Administration appointed a total of 258 federal judges, 37 Black.

In the House of Representatives, more Black staffers can be found, but there are none in the offices of the top leaderships, such as House Speaker Jim Wright (D-Tex.), Majority Leader Tom Foley (D-Wash.), and Majority Whip Tony Coelho (D-Calif.). This issue was raised at a recent meeting between the top leadership and the Congressional Black Caucus. That is an ongoing dialogue. Mervyn Dymally, Congressional Black Caucus Chairman's office, says there is some evidence of change in the Majority Whip's office

and the clerk's office. The issue is not only about employment of Blacks, but it includes qualitative positions.

Mario Cuomo, who won a tight governor's race in New York which was contributed to by the large Black vote, has a disappointing Black hiring record. The report shows that he has appointed few Blacks to top posts in state agencies, none to his inner circle.

The Reagan Administration has set the tone for perpetuation of the lack of Blacks being hired, the feeling of alienation, while he gives lip service to a color-blind policy, which in action is blind to equality, rights and justice for people of color.

"typical" male behavior.

There are signs that the program is making a difference. Some 100 youths have participated, some for as long as a year and a half. One ten-year-old participant, responding to questions from a local newspaper reporter, said that the program was teaching him how to make decisions, and not to make a baby unless he can support

it. Another sign of success is the local Urban League Chapter's recent decision to adopt and replicate this program.

The adults involved benefit too. The youths' growth and learning are "a constant source of excitement and education for me," says Smith.
