There are a number of programs designed to assist Nevada's mentally and physically handicapped family members, friends and associates — many of the staff and volunteers for which are, themselves, disabled. Programs are often added or expanded to address their special needs.

Nevada Association for the Handicapped (NAH) helps people with severe handicaps, including those who are deaf, speech impaired, physically handicapped due to birth defect, accident, or disease, or mentally limited, to become as self-sufficient as possible.

Through an Independent Living program, clients acquire the tools to break down barriers and develop skills for daily living. Day Training teaches behavioral and prevocational skills for advancement to a work activity program such as the Association's ''Project Income'' which often leads to placement within the private sector of the State's economy.

Nevada Specially Trained Effective Parents (N-STEP) encourages positive parent participation and also establishes a parent/professional partnership to promote education, medical and legislative advances.

Nevada Association for the Handicapped, a statewide United Way agency, is also recognized for providing the most comprehensive library in Nevada specializing in information and resources for disabled citizens.



BLACKS TOLD TO MOBILIZE FOR QUALITY EDUCATION

Congressional Black Caucus Weekend Participants Warn of Danger to Future Generations

WASHINGTON – During four days of meetings and formal speeches at the 17th Annual Congressional Black Caucus Weekend, black Americans were urged to mobilize and work to improve significantly the education of black children.

With the theme, "Educating the Black Child: Our Past and Our Present," many of the more than 20,000 weekend attendees expressed the fear that current conditions pose a serious threat to coming generations of blacks, and other Americans, unless dramatic improvements are made in the nation's educational systems.

"Educational systems. "Education has always been the key with which black Americans have opened the door to improve their lives," said U.S. Representative Charles Hayes (D-IL), a caucus member who also serves on the House Education and Labor Committee. "But in the next decade, we will need even more education and more skills in order to successfully compete in this increasingly complicated technological society."

compete in this increasingly complicated technological society." The weekend featured 55 issues forums, discussion groups and "braintrusts," an industrial trade fair and the simultaneous annual meetings of dozens of other black organizations.

The two Congressional Black Caucus Spouses Fashion Shows, sponsored principally by Philip Morris Companies Inc., proved to be among the weekend's most popular social events. 
weekend events. The Congressional Black Caucus was founded in 1970, at a time when there were 1,400 black elected officials in the country.

Today there are more than 6,600 black elected officials in America and 30 caucuses of black state lawmakers modeled after the National CBC.
