Valley Star Dies After Car Wreck

Paul Wofford, star running back for the Valley High School football team, died shortly after 1:30 p.m. Monday at University Medical Center of head injuries he suffered in a Saturday morning auto accident north of St. George, Utah.

Southern AAA All-Conference

Wofford, a senior, was the second leading rusher and second leading scorer in Southern Nevada this year, rushing for 976 yards and scoring 10 touchdowns.

Gerber characterized Wofford as being a great team

Wofford was declared brain dead Saturday morning after the crash.

Wofford was driving north on Interstate 15 around 5:40 a.m. Saturday with passengers Johnny Yancey, a former Valley football player, and Darrel Charlton, a former Valley track runner, to see a Weber State football game in Ogden, Utah.

Valley football Coach Dave Gerber said Wofford fell asleep at the wheel and the car hit the medium and swerved to the shoulder. Gerber said one of the passengers yelled and Wofford over-corrected. The car swerved off the wet road, turning end-over-end.

Wofford was thrown out of the car.

Gerber said Wofford was going to the Weber State game to watch his friends Darian Scott and Kelvin Dexter play - both had played football for Valley in 1985 and to tell them that he had been named to this year's

"He led both on and off the field," Gerber said. "He was always in front during the drills and the rest of the kids really respected him.'

Wofford, a Dallas native, had said earlier in the season he wanted to play football at the University of Texas but at 5-feet-11 and 180 pounds Wofford's chances for a major college scholarship were considered slim. What he lacked in size he made up in quickness and determination

'Just last week we were saying how much he look like Frank Hawkins when he was a senior," Gerber said. "Frank wasn't that big as a senior but went up to Reno and put on weight.

With Paul's quickness Reno would have loved to have him.'

In last Friday's zone semi-final game, Wofford ran for 83 yards and one touchdown in overtime to lead the Vikings over Chaparral 41-38.
