Valley beat Bonanza to capture the 1987 Southern AAA Title. Behind quarterback DJ Harris and RB-WR Mark Pak the Vikings came from behind to win 22-19.

Professional boxing returns to the Showboat Hotel, Casino, Country Club and Bowling Center for the first time in three months on Friday, Nov. 20, with a card featuring 1984 Olympic gold medalist and world-ranked contender Henry Tillman in the main event.

Tillman, rated by both the World Boxing Association and the World Boxing Coun cil, meets former world championship contender Dwain "Slick Black" Bonds in the heavyweight 10-round main.

The new "Boxing At The 'Boat'' program, promoted by the Showboat and assembled by veteran Las Vegas matchmaker Mel Greb, starts at a later, more convenient time - 7:30 p.m. Doors to the Showboat Sports Pavilion open at 6:30.

Ticket prices remain the same - \$12 for general admission and \$20 for ringside reserved. They are on sale from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday at the Showboat Sports Pavilion Ticket Office.

Also on the card will be five Las Vegans—undefeated bantamweight Akeem Anifowoshe, unbeaten light heavyweight Tim Davis and light-

The tall boxer-puncher from Los Angeles is fighting in Las Vegas for the first time in 11 months, and is coming off three impressive wins, two by knockout.

On Aug. 22 in Columbia, S.C., his most recent outing, he stopped Danny Sutton in the seventh round. On July 11 in Atlantic City he beat K.T. Porter on June 7 in Providence, R.I., he halted Henry Clark in the seventh.

Tillman, a gold medal winner for the United States at the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles, has won all six of his fights in Las Vegas, knocking out Bashiru Ali and Cedric Parsons of the Marvelous Marvin Hagler stable in the first round, Oscar Holman in the sixth and Stanely Ross in the fourth and deci
