NAACP Membership Contest

Since 1909 when the NAACP was organized and

had a very few friends to turn to, it has been able to depend upon the encouragement and support of the Black Church. During the Civil Rights Movement of the sixties, churches throughout America and especially in the South gave financial support as well as served as meeting places for the NAACP branches.

Today, as then, we are requesting your continued help From time to time, members of your congregation and your friends come to the NAACP for help and no one is ever refused. The NAACP helps those who are members as well as those who are non-members.

The NAACP needs your help in organizing a city-wide membership contest. There will be established three groups of churches and organizations according to the number of members in each church and organization.

1. Group A churches — 300 members and above; 2. Group B churches — 150-299 members; 3. Group C churches — 10-149 members; 4. Group A. organiza-

tions — 50 members and above; 5. Group B organizations — 20-49 members; 6. Group C organizations—5-19 members.

The church with the highest number of memberships in each group will receive an award at the NAACP Freedom Fund Banquet in the fall of 1988. The purpose of this contest is to get every member of each group to join the NAACP. The complaints we process every Tuesday night at 7:00 p.m. in the Branch Office lets us know proof positive that racial discrimination in Las Vegas in 1988 is alive and well.

sonnel, and couldn't even have integrated lists of clients. This would force some agencies to choose between continuing to serve poor clients with counseling services or to end their abortion services.

Finally, the rule bars federal funds to any program that "encourages, promotes, or advocates abortion."

That imposes upon recipients of federal funds the requirement that they forego their constitutional right to free speech.

The federal courts have already ruled such requirements unconstitutional in other instances and there's no reason to suppose this

attempted end run at the Constitution won't be struck down, too.

The new rules apply to federal funds distributed under Title X of the Public Health Service Act, the basis for federal funding of family planning services for the poor.

Well over four million women a year are served by Title X agencies. They get services that include testing for pregnancy, counseling on contraception and family planning, and — if they are pregnant — information on health care services and the range of options available to them.

That usually includes a list of health providers, including abortion services. Clients can get counseling about what an abortion entails and whether it is a viable option for them.

Affluent women get advice from their own doctors without hindrance. Poor women who go to family planning centers aided by federal funds, and who don't have other health counseling options, would be affected by the new rule.

That's because the family planning agencies aided by Title X funds help avert an estimated 800,000 unintended pregnancies a year. If they're forced out of business or have to curtail activities because of the new rule, it is expected that those pregnancies will occur, and up to half may end through abortions.

Abortion is not the issue in this rule—fairness, rights to privacy and free speech, and medical ethics are the issues. Congress and the courts should act to overturn the new rule.

THE STRUGGLE FOR EQUALITY CONTINUES

Dr. Benjamin L. hooks. Executive Director for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, will be the featured speaker at the 20th Anniversary of the Life Membership Banquet. Under the theme, "The Struggle For Equality Continues," he will focus on today's mixed picture of black employment.

To a degree, the black middle-class shows signs of expansion as more blacks gain entry to the workplace of white collar corporate America. Blacks als continue to make gains in the higher reaches of public sector employment, and some jobs in the skilled trades, from which blacks were formally barred have, under pressure, begun to open up.

The NAACP has made an important contribution to the expansion of employment opportunities for black Americans. Yet, here as in other areas, the illusion of progress must not obscure hard unpleasant realities. The promise of full employment is still an elusive dream for millions of poor Americans, a large number of whom are black.

The NAACP recognizes that the major causes of unemployment among blacks are due largely to past and present patterns of racial discrimination; lack of adequate education; lack of appropriate skills; and lack of knowledge abou the working of the labor market and the business world. 

her life to lead over 300 others to freedom along the secret route of the Underground Railroad.

Tubman, who was born circa 1820, was one of the most prominent abolitionists of her day. She also served during the U.S. Civil War as a nurse, laundress and spy for the Federal forces. Fellow abolitionist John Brown refers to her in his letters as "one of the best and bravest persons on this continent — General Tubman as we call her."

Following the war, Tubman made her home in Auburn, N.Y. The 75th anniversary of her death there is marked on March 10, 1988, Harriet Tubman Day.

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
