SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS GROUP DONATES TO SCHOOL BUILDING FUND

The Clark County Association of School Administrators (CCASA) today sealed their endorsement of the Clark County School District Building Program with a \$1,000 campaign donation.

The 10-year, \$674 million building program proposes construction of 77 new schools throughout Clark County along with additions and improvements to many existing schools.

CCASA president Roger Bryan said, "We highly endorse the school building program. Our membership is sensitive to the need for more year-round schools, but above and beyond that we have a critical shortage of schools, period!

"The district's projections in the proposed building plan are conservative. We are pleased the plan includes secondary schools, a need which wasn't addressed at all in the last building pro-

gram," he noted.

Because by law public funds cannot be used to seek voter approval of school building referendums, prov-

building referendums, private sources are used to pay campaign expenses.

The school district has previously approved the building program in concept.

The 300 members of CCASA includes principals, assistant principals and central office school district administrators.

KVVU TV5 ANNOUNCES MINORITY SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

A scholarship program for minority college students majoring in broadcasting or radio and television studies has been established by the Meredith Broadcasting Group which owns and operates television station KVVU TV5. of the CSFA Merit Point System, and the awards paid by CSFA on behalf of Meredith Corporation.
