"We must seek to strengthen the bond between home and school," says NEA President Mary Hatwood Futrell. "Together, parents and teachers can form a vital partnership in helping children reach their fullest po-

"The educational process begins in the home," adds

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Futrell, "Parents are their children's first teachers. That teaching role need not end at the schoolhouse door when their children begin their formal education.

Seventy-five percent of parents and teachers polled by the metropolitan Life Survey of the American Teacher 1987 supported additional parental involvement in the public schools.

'We need to build on that good will," notes Futrell," for the good of our children as well as our national future.

The developer of the new NEA training package, Dorothy Rich, who developed the training materials, emphasizes that "school districts should empower teachers with the knowledge, strategies, and skills to reach out and work with parents.'

Rich is the founder and president of the Home and School Institute, a nonprofit educational organization, and innovator in home and school relations since 1964.

LAS VEGAS PTA COUNCIL DONATES \$2,500 TO SCHOOL **BUILDING PROGRAM**

The governing body of Clark County PTA's, the Las Vegas Area Council PTA, announced a donation of \$2,500 to support passage of the school building program which will go before county voters May 24. Area Council PTA President Jan Churchill simultaneously announced the organization's endorsement of the building plan.

"The need for new schools is evident. For our children's sake, we've got to address that need now." Churchill stated.

The Las Vegas Area Council PTA represents units from over 60 Clark County schools. More than half of the state's 30,000 PTA members are affiliated with the Las Vegas Area Council PTA

By law public funds cannot be used to finance school building referendums. A citizens committee was recently formed to solicit funds for a public campaign to urge voter approval of the building program.

The \$600 million school bond issue proposes construction of 77 new schools and the remodeling and renovation of many existing schools to meet the district's facility needs over the next 10 years. Voter approval of the building program will not result in a tax incrase, but will hold the rate for school facilities at present levels. Experts say once the measure is approved taxes could even show a decline in later years of the program.
